Jacob Marschak. President-Elect of the American Economic Association, died suddenly on July 27, 1977. He was responsible for the organization of the program of the American Economic Association at these meetings. Jacob Marschak's own work in economics ranged over a number of topics, and in particular: rational and actual decision-making on the part of individuals and groups; optimal organization, with particular reference to the transmission of information: money and the theory of assets; and economic and scientific method. He also retained an enthusiastic interest in ongoing work in all branches of economics as well as in related developments in mathematics, philosophy, and science generally. Selected essays of Professor Marschak have been collected in the 3-volume work, Economic Information. Decision, and Prediction (Dordrecht, Holland/Boston, USA: D. Reidel Publishing Co., 1974).

Professor Marschak chose three main themes for the 1977 American Economic Association meetings: (1) the boundaries of economics, with several sessions on how economics has related and might relate to other scientific and humanistic disciplines; (2) macroeconomics, with emphasis both upon the goals and the effectiveness of policy; and (3) the application of economics to societal problems. The proceedings will constitute for his many friends, students, and colleagues a memorial of the achievements and influence of Jacob Marschak.





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
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
