The **European Economic Association** is inaugurating a new journal—the *Journal of the European Economic Association*, *JEEA*, for short. Starting in 2003, the *JEEA* replaces the *European Economic Review* as the Association's official journal. Unlike its predecessor, the *JEEA* is fully owned and directly governed by the Association. The Association's firm intention is to make the *JEEA* one of the top journals in economics. MIT Press has been chosen to publish the *JEEA*. The journal will be edited by a team that spans the main fields of economics: Patrick Bolton (Princeton, from January 2003), Jordi Gali (CREI, from January 2004), Alan Krueger (Princeton, from January 2003), Roberto Perotti (EUI, from January 2003) and Xavier Vives (INSEAD, from July 2003). Four regular issues will be published annually. In addition, each yearly volume will include a double issue with the Proceedings from the previous year's EEA Congress, beginning with selected papers from the 2002 Venice Congress in Vol. 1, Issue 2/3. Call for papers. The *Review of Economics and the Household* (REHO) announces a special issue, dedicated to the memory of Leslie A. Whittington. Leslie died on September 11, 2001, when American Airlines flight 77 was hijacked and crashed into the Pentagon. Leslie received her Ph.D. in economics from the University of Colorado at Boulder in 1989. She had taught at the University of Maryland-College Park, and was most recently at the Georgetown Public Policy Institute at Georgetown University, where she had also served as Associate Dean. Leslie's research interests centered on the economics of the family, especially the many interactions of tax policies and family decisions. To honor and remember Leslie's contributions, *REHO* plans a special issue on the broad theme of household composition and public policy.
