Financial support for the Undergraduate Women in Economics RCT came from the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation through grant no. G-2014-14504. In the past three years, I have received:

1. A salary from Columbia University Mailman School of Public Health for research assistant work on the “A Randomized Trial of Letters to Encourage Prescription Monitoring Program Use And Safe Opioid Prescribing” project with Adam Sacarny and co-authors (spring 2021), which was funded by a grant (\$143K) from the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab;
2. A summer stipend and dissertation fellowship from Columbia University as a graduate student at the Department of Economics (2021-2022);
3. A salary from the Institute of Social Science at the University of Tokyo (2022-2023);
4. A salary from Bowdoin College (2023-present).

I have not received any other significant sources of funding or financial support during this period.

5. In 2021, I was an organizer for the *Diverse Economics Conference: People, Perspectives, Careers*, a conference aimed at promoting diversity in the field of economics. The conference was co-organized with the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond and the Robins School of Business at the University of Richmond. This was an unpaid organizer position. The conference continued in 2022 and 2023, but I was not involved in the organizing process in those years.
