September 9-10, 2022

We invite submissions for the 2nd Women in International Economics Conference, which will be held **in-person on September 9 and 10, 2022**.

The workshop will include 7 papers, with discussants, and a keynote. We are delighted to announce that **Linda Tesar, Professor of Economics, University of Michigan and Co-Director of the NBER International Finance and Macroeconomics Program**, has confirmed her participation as the keynote speaker. The workshop will include a mentoring session between senior and junior women.

The goal of this conference is to enhance diversity within the field of international economics by providing junior women with a forum to present work and receive constructive feedback and mentorship. The presenting author of each paper must be a junior woman\*\*\* in the field of international economics. Submitted papers may be co-authored with anyone regardless of gender or seniority.

The submission deadline is **13 May 2022**. Interested authors are invited to submit a paper at <https://forms.gle/GQBCkn9qFXWF1Y1T6>. Acceptances will be notified by **1 June 2022**.

We have limited funding for travel expenses for presenters and discussants. We encourage participants who are able to fund their travel from their research budgets to do so to enable additional funding for others.
