Race, Gender, and Opioid Treatment Admissions: The Effect of PDMPs on the Most Afflicted with Alberto Ortega

Opioid abuse has been nationally recognized as an epidemic. To reduce the rapid increase in prescription opioid abuse, diversion, and mortality, state governments have enacted Prescription Drug Monitoring Programs (PDMP) to track all prescribing and dispensing data. Moreover, the opioid epidemic has disproportionately affected some demographic groups more than others (Case and Deaton, 2015); however, research on demographic differences resulting from targeted opioid-reduction policies are seldom examined. This paper uses a difference-in-differences approach to estimate the effect of PDMP implementation on admissions into drug treatment facilities for opioid abuse across race, gender, and ethnicity. We find that the implementation of PDMPs significantly decreased the probability of admission into substance abuse treatment facility for opioid abuse. This finding is not consistent across racial or ethnic lines, and is overwhelmingly driven by White individuals, particularly White women.

Flipping the Script: The Effect of PDMPs on Prescribing Behavior

with Alice Ellyson & Alberto Ortega

The debilitating effects of the opioid epidemic have been well documented and many public policies have been aimed at curbing the epidemic at a common point of initiation of opioid abuse, the prescription. We consider the effect of one of these policies, Prescription Drug Monitoring Programs (PDMPs), on opioid prescribing trends for a given provider in various medical specialties. PDMPs enable healthcare providers to access a patients opioid use history in an effort to reduce the abuse and misuse of opioids. Specifically, we assess PDMP program characteristics and differential effects by provider specialty using the CMS Part D Public Use File, and a differences-in-differences approach. We find that providers in states implementing a PDMP with a mandatory query significantly reduce the rate at which they prescribe opioids compared to those without a mandatory query. We also find this effect varies across specialty type.

Substance Abuse in Vulnerable Populations: Implications of ACA with Alberto Ortega

Prior to the Affordable Care Act (ACA) substance abuse treatment was not included in all medical coverage. As of 2014 the ACA mandated that such treatment be included in the ten essential health benefits (EHBs). At this time ACA also rolled out the Medicaid expansion which 32 states have adopted. In this paper, we exploit the timing of the Medicaid Expansion in conjunction with ACAs EHBs, to estimate the impact on Americans access to drug treatment facilities and overdose related deaths. We find expanding Medicaid had a statistically significant effect on Medicaid admissions into substance abuse treatment facilities. While substance abuse is on the rise, states which have expanded Medicaid have begun to see an increase in the use of some of the benefits for substance abuse

Has TRIPS Caused Greater Inequitable Access to Pharmaceuticals?
