1. My research time and the time of two research assistants on this project was funded by a grant from the Research Center for the Sycuan Institute on Tribal Gaming (SITG). The center is housed in the L. Robert Payne School of Hospitality and Tourism Management and supported by the San Diego State University Research Foundation. The research was undertaken with the clear understanding that the investigators have the full right to publish any results obtained by them, without prior approval of SITG or any other organization or individual and subject only to established safeguards for the protection of privacy or confidentiality. My co-author, Prof. Spilde, is the Chair of the SITG. The SITG grant program is guided by federal standards in the review of applications. An independent panel composed of researchers in the field evaluates proposals and makes the final funding decisions.
2. I am a consulting economist with a focus on American Indian economic development. Over the past three years I have received consulting income greater than \$10,000 and access to data under confidentiality agreements for work related to American Indian gaming policy from:
  - a. the Arizona Indian Gaming Association,
  - b. the Flandreau Santee Sioux Tribe,

  - d. the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians, and
  - e. the Yavapai-Apache Nation.
